Moments Matter, Attendance Counts



Both Dorset and the Department for Education have recently launched a new campaign to improve school attendance. They would like to make sure parents and carers' understand the importance of school attendance. As we regularly make the same points, we are happy to support these campaigns too.

We know that sometimes our pupils cannot come to school because they are really unwell - and that's the right thing to do for them and other students. Medical advice is clear however that children with mild illness will often be well enough to attend - for example if they have a cough, or cold, without a temperature. The NHS guidance <u>Is my child too ill for school?</u> is designed to support parents in their decision making about mild illness.

We also know that pupils fall behind their friends and classmates when they miss school. At Southill we want the amount of missed education to be reduced as much as possible. We believe that our community is stronger together, with all of our pupils in school, on time, every day. We are building life skills, life-





long friendships and preparing your child for future success.

Here's what we'd like you to do:

- Send your child in every day, when you feel they are well enough to do so.
- If you are not sure whether your child is well enough to attend school, send them in anyway as they often perk up on arrival.
- Telephone the school before 8.30am each day of your child's absence.
- Tell the school in advance of any medical appointments and bring in appointment cards/letters.
- If you and your child are experiencing difficulties with school attendance then talk to us as a first step so we can help!

Please also see <u>Chief Medical Officer Chris Whitty's letter on mild illness and school attendance</u> that says a prolonged period of absence is likely to heighten a child's anxiety about attending school in the future.

NSPCC's Speak out. Stay safe. programme

I am pleased to inform you that we are participating in the NSPCC's *Speak out. Stay safe.* programme this term. *Speak out. Stay safe.* is a programme for children aged 5-11 which aims to help children understand abuse in all its forms and to recognise the signs of abuse. Children are taught to speak out if they are worried, either to a safe adult or Childline.

This child-friendly programme is aligned with the curriculum and consists of age appropriate virtual assemblies and supporting classroom based activities (which we have reviewed). The content is delivered in an engaging and interactive way with the help of the NSPCC mascot Buddy. I will deliver the separate KS1 and KS2 assemblies and there will also be some follow-up work in class to discuss the key messages of the programme.
